

A LITTLE BEDE OF HISTORY

The advert in the last edition of the *Fosdyke Newsletter* declaring vacancies at the almshouses of the Charity of Sir Thomas Middlecott fired up our journalistic tendencies. What's it all about? Here's the Clerk to the Trustees, Denis Glen's, explanation.

The Algarkirk and Fosdyke almshouses were first conceived in 1624 by Sir Thomas Middlecott, a local resident and land owner, who "desired that almshouses" be built. The almshouses were built in 1635 and were originally meant for a master and nine inmates, four of whom were to be from Fosdyke and five from Algarkirk, usually single paupers aged over forty. These almshouses were one of a number of endowments by Sir Thomas Middlecott in the local area, others being a number of almshouses in Boston and a school at Kirton.

The almshouses at Fosdyke, located at the junction of Puttock Gate and Wash Road and known locally as the Bede Row, still exist but in a much altered and extended form since they were sold into private ownership in

1979. The original building was of local brick with a thatched roof with each resident having a single room. There were two earth closet toilets for all ten residents, one at each end of the building, and a well at the front for obtaining fresh water for washing and drinking. During the first half of the last century the thatched roof was over clad with asbestos sheets. Originally the master received twelve old pence per week and the inmates eight old pence along with cloaks and coal. Regular attendance at Fosdyke Church was compulsory and if found brawling, frequenting of taverns, absence at night or other offences then penalties were imposed. During the flood of 1810 when parts of Fosdyke were inundated the almshouses were flooded and had to be evacuated the cost of repairs amounting to nine shillings and tuppence. To maintain the almshouses and residents, in his will of 1638, Sir Thomas Middlecott endowed the charity with small farms at Wigtoft, Swineshead, Bennington and Old Leake.

By the 1970's there were only two residents of the almshouses, the last of whom died in 1978. They were also in a very dilapidated condition with the cost of updating them to modern standards well beyond the financial means of the charity at that time. The Trustees therefore took the decision to sell the almshouses and to build a pair

of modern bungalows in the centre of the village. These bungalows were built in 1980 and stand next to the village hall with one of the original residents now in her 90th year still occupying her bungalow. In 1983 the charity was re-constituted with a new Charity Commission scheme and new Trustees. This scheme designated that there be three co-opted trustees each from Fosdyke and Algarkirk, one trustee nominated by each of the Parish Councils and whoever is the vicar for the two parishes. In 1990 the trustees had accumulated sufficient funds to build another pair of bungalows in Algarkirk and these are located at the junction of Lee Avenue and Church Lane opposite the Church yard. In the late 1990's the Trustees sold most of the land at Old Leake and Bennington and with the proceeds of this sale purchased a farm at Thorney. This farm and the land at Swineshead and Wigtoft provide the income to maintain the new almshouses.

Scam Details

When you attempt to ring the number back, you are charged a very high premium rate telephone call charge.

Please do not return any telephone calls from numbers that you do not recognise if the call has been disconnected before any verbal contact being made. Numbers starting with 074 or 075 should be treated with caution.

You may not be aware of the charges until you receive your next telephone bill.

If summer ever decides to arrive, keep an eye on the condition of your lawn. Give it a summer feed, especially if a spring feed was not done. If you're planning a new lawn, now is the time to start clearing stones and perennial weeds in readiness for sowing in September.

Lift and divide your Daffodil Bulbs, this should be done every four years. After the foliage has died down, which should be about mid-July, get your favourite spade and dig straight down, starting several inches from the clump. Bulbs pull themselves deeper in the soil than planted over the years and if you mulch heavily they can be quite deep. You don't want to chop their heads off! Store in a cool airy shed ready for planting later in the year.

Now is a great time to take cuttings. If your heather has gone a bit woody, remove a strong, healthy, non-flowering shoot with clean secateurs, cutting straight across the stem about 4" below the tip. Then use a sharp knife to trim the cutting to 2" long. Strip leaves from the lower third of the cutting. Some gardeners like to pinch out the tips of the cuttings too, this can be helpful to encourage a bushier cutting. Hormone rooting powder is not essential, some people use a

bit of spit! Fill a pot with a mixture of equal parts grit and peaty compost (heathers require an acid growing medium). Insert each cutting so the lower leaves are just resting on the compost. Water in, but don't firm them in. The cuttings will need potting on, but can be planted out in spring.

The first flush of flowers on your roses should be over in July. Cut the flowering stem by a third, which will count as a summer pruning, and more blooms should be on their way. It may also be a good time for another fertiliser dressing for the roses.

If you're looking after the wildlife in your garden, leave some dense vegetation near your ponds, so any emerging young frogs have somewhere to shelter from hot sun or predators. Also, herbs, such as Lavender, Sage and Marjoram, thrive at this time of the year and provide nectar for butterflies and other insects.



NONE FOR THE ROAD

As the summer gets underway our thoughts may turn to long summer days, enjoying time with friends and getting that all important BBQ dusted off and ready for action, we need to remember drivers have a responsibility to ensure they are fit to drive.

Lincolnshire police will be conducting road side checks to arrest and prosecute those drivers who drive whilst under the influence of drink or drugs. As well as breathalyser checks, Field Impairment Checks (FIT) will be carried out on those drivers suspected of driving whilst under the influence of drugs.

Highly visible and well signed road checks will be in operation across the County. Checks will be carried out in early morning, evening and night time.

Although people will say they are okay to drive, it is almost impossible to calculate accurately whether they are. The body processes alcohol at around one unit per hour, this process is governed by many factors:

Age, gender, weight, body mass, metabolism, general health, the type of alcohol you are drinking and the health of your liver, to name a few.

Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership reminds everyone they have a responsibility when behind the wheel to ensure they are fit to do so. Impairment through drink or drugs carries severe penalties for those convicted and those who refuse testing will suffer the same penalties through the Courts. When people are enjoying the summer BBQs, we ask you to make provision to travel by nominating a designated driver or pre-arranging a taxi home.

In the past year, in Lincolnshire,

five people have died in more than eighty drink related collisions and more than 120 people have been injured, some have suffered serious, and often life changing, injuries where drink or drugs were a contributory factor.

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SOMETHING DIFFERENT, SOMETHING ENJOYABLE AND FUN

July is traditionally the time when we go on – or are just about to go on – holiday; and if you are fortunate enough to be going away on a break I hope you have a lovely time and come back refreshed and restored.

Our word “holidays” comes, of course, from “Holy Days”. Before the industrial revolution and the Factory Acts of the 19th century, the only time off from work was on a Holy Day (Sunday, Christmas Day and Good Friday). I think the linking of “Holy Days” and “holidays” is more than mere coincidence. I think we can learn from what those early holy days meant to show us how to enjoy our holidays.

First of all a Holy Day meant rest: rest from the daily round of chores and looking after animals and crops. Each village had its own special holy days of celebration (usually to do with the patron saint of the parish church) so that travelling entertainment could plan an itinerary and arrive to liven up proceedings in the form of a fair or a troupe of players. And we all need rest.

Secondly, on a Holy Day God connects with us through a church service: God touches and refreshes us through Word and Sacrament. Similarly, on our holidays we are refreshed again. No longer tired and worn out we are refreshed and ready to return to our usual daily way of being.

Thirdly, and finally, on a Holy Day we remember how God in Jesus brought into being a new creation. So on our holidays we enjoy re-creation – doing something different, something enjoyable and fun, so that we are renewed. This moves beyond refreshment to seeing things differently and from a new

perspective. And we are often enabled to see new ways of tackling the opportunities and challenges of daily life.

Sunday is our primary “Holy” day, of course, so I hope that even if you are not able to go away on holiday this summer, you will find a time each week for rest, refreshment and recreation, so that you can engage with the warp and weft of normal daily life afresh.



S**T!


In the *Fosdyke Nesletter* (March issue) we reminded dog owners of the fixed penalty of £50 for allowing their dogs to foul anywhere with a speed limit under 40 mph. *Most of Fosdyke is 30.*

Living in a small village like Fosdyke that has a fairly high percentage of dog owners you expect people to be considerate of others and act in a civilised manner - that's not to suggest we have Neanderthals living here but there are some dog owners who still allow their dogs to foul on footpaths, verges and roads and don't pick up the mess.

Free dog bags are available from the council so there's no excuse about cost (and there's that fine, remember?). You may be a bit squeamish about picking up poo - the smell and texture, etc. - but, if you have a pet, they are going to defecate on a regular basis and as an owner you have a responsibility to deal with it. So, every time you take your dog for a walk slip a couple of poo bags in your pocket, an old supermarket bag will do, because at some point during their walk they are going to poo. Remember that verges count too. I'll reiterate: it's anywhere with a speed limit under 40 mph. When you've gotta go, you've gotta go. And dogs are no different.

Why the rant? We've had irate villagers ringing us about

inconsiderate dog owners leaving s**t virtually on their doorsteps and not picking it up. Take it home. Or use the dog poo bin (located at the end of Puttock Gate, if you didn't know).



It isn't pleasant. I'm sure the culprits wouldn't be very happy if someone came to their house and squated on their drive. Please be considerate!

Some of the hard-to-pronounce parasites left behind in the soil by uncollected dog faeces include *Cryptosporidium*, *Giardia*,

Salmonella, as well as hookworms, ringworms and tapeworms. Infections from these bugs often cause fever, muscle aches, headache, vomiting, diarrhea and serious kidney disorders. Children are most susceptible, since they often play in the dirt and put things in their mouths or eyes.

If you don't give a s**t about others consider that your own dog could pick up any one of these parasites left by an equally ignorant dog owner and take it into your home. Justice, some might say.

A survey carried out in a part of America showed that forty-four per cent of dog walkers who did not pick up after their dogs indicated they would still refuse to pick up—even if confronted by complaints from neighbors, threatened with fines, or provided with more sanitary and convenient options for retrieving and disposing of dog waste. We ain't yanks though, and surely not so ignorant.

So, if you're taking your dog for a walk, and your poop decides to poo, hope, before you walk off and leave the mess, that there's no one around with a phone or camera in their hands unless you're desperate to appear in the *Fosdyke Newsletter*. Instead, dip into your pocket, pull out the bag and BAG IT, TIE IT, BIN IT!
