

SEASONAL SCAM ALERT - UNDELIVERED MAIL OR PARCELS

Please beware of any emails coming through alerting you to an undelivered parcel or letter.

Scam details

You will receive an email stating wording along the following example:

Royal Mail has detained your package for some reason (for example, lack of a proper invoice, bill of sale, or other documentation, a possible trademark violation, or if the package requires a formal entry) the RM International Mail Branch holding it will notify you of the reason for detention (in writing) and how you can get it released.

Please fulfil the documents attached.

Please do not open any attachments or give any personal details. (Any numbers given maybe premium rate numbers)

If you are expecting post or packages please ring your local sorting office direct to arrange delivery or collection.

There are similar emails too purporting to be from parcel delivery companies like UPS.

EXTERNAL DOMESTIC MAIL BOXES ALERT

Following a recent incident in the county, I would like to make owners of external mail boxes aware that fraudsters may target mail boxes that are located at the end of driveways to access post inside.

If you suffer any damage to an external mail box, please ensure that you report it so we can monitor cases across the county.

Type of fraud

This is where a fraudster will apply for credit cards that are then posted to your address; they will then force open the mail box to gain access to the credit cards when they are delivered. Normally the member of the public will not know 'they' have applied for the card till the fraudster starts using the cards for purchases and the invoices arrive.

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

NEW YEAR, NEW GARDEN

You may be full of Christmas pud and it may be cold outside, but January is the time to start thinking about the gardening year ahead. Even though everything may look a bit lifeless in the garden, there is an awful lot you can do to start your garden off on the right foot.

As seed catalogues are beginning to arrive, it's a good time to settle down with a nice cuppa, and pick something new for this year to grow.

- Go through last year's seeds. Many are still good, seeds generally last three years with excellent germination. Keep your unused seeds in a cool, dry place, not the tool shed, garage, or on top of a radiator where temperature and humidity can fluctuate and ruin them. If in doubt, throw them out!

- If you're really keen and have the time, you could make a seed-sowing chart. This is not as labour intensive as it sounds and its very useful, as it helps to know which seeds/plants have done well or not, so you can decide what to buy the following year.

- Mark down date of when seeds were sown, and when pricked out and potted on, and last of all, when the plant flowered.

- Don't forget to read the small print on the seed descriptions – there's not much point trying to grow tropical plants in Fosdyke!

If you fancy a small fruit tree and have room, got for it!

- Dig a big hole and fork in loads of well-rotted compost or manure before planting out. Make sure the ground isn't too wet or frozen.

- Many fruit trees are available in dwarf sizes, and some in mini sizes that can be grown in large patio containers.

- You'll need to give it lots of love and attention though – fruit trees need regular pruning and spraying if you want loads of yummy fruit.

- Order straight from the grower for the best range of sizes and varieties

- Cut out diseased or dead wood from established fruit trees like apples and pears, as well as crossing branches. This will let plenty of light in to ripen the fruit. Apply some general granular fertilizer or chicken manure pellets around the base of fruit trees.

January is a very good time to prune most deciduous trees and shrubs because they're dormant and will have lost most or all of their leaves, making it easier to see what needs to be done. The prime pruning targets are the "Three D's": the dead, diseased, and damaged wood.

Prune lower branches that are too low and get in your way, or those that hang over the house (which can make it seem dark in the summer).

However, don't prune any spring flowering shrubs or trees like quince, forsythia or Spirea. Prune them after they've flowered if you need to, or you'll end up removing their spring flowers (doh!).

You and the trees will feel so much lighter when you've done it. Definitely a bonus in January!

When soil conditions allow, continue to dig over beds and borders, incorporating as much organic matter as you can. Forking over not only helps prepare the soil for next year, it helps reduce pests by exposing them to hungry birds. Sadly many weeds will survive the cold weather, so once the soil is workable, hoe away before they leap into action in the spring.

January is also excellent time to plant bare root plants. Trees and shrubs planted this month, will have plenty of time to establish their root

systems before hot weather arrives (assuming it does!)

- There are several winter-blooming shrubs that can add delightful colour and fragrance.

- When selecting a spot for new shrubs, remember that areas that are sunny now may be in the shade when deciduous trees are in leaf. Don't forget to keep newly planted trees and shrubs well watered until they are established.

If there's a mild day, empty the greenhouse, sweep it out, wash it down, scrub down benches etc. Keep greenhouse watering cans or tanks full so that it is not icy when watering pot plants. Cold water can be as shocking to delicate houseplants as it is to us!

Clean up garden furniture and give wood a good drink of protective oil. This is also a good time to clean out pots and seed trays, especially if the weather is too yucky to do anything else. Also sharpen and repair mowers, secateurs, shredders and other garden implements. Have your mower serviced, too!

Remember that insects are gardeners' friends as well as foes! They are natural pest controllers, and will keep each other's populations down to manageable levels once your garden has got back into a natural balance. Put out log and twig piles made from old prunings and felled trees. These provide valuable shelter for wildlife, and can be made into attractive features by planting up with ferns, primroses, or other suitable plants. A site well away from the house should ensure that unwanted creepy crawlies do not stray into domestic rooms.

You may wish to identify a suitable part of the garden to leave untouched as a wildlife area. A small patch behind a shed is perfectly fine if you're worried about it looking untidy.

Watch out for flocks of fieldfare that can be found in the fields around Fosdyke in the winter, and in harsh weather you may find these colourful birds eating berries from your trees or foraging on your lawn. When there is snow around it becomes difficult for ground-foraging birds to find a meal. Laying out a bit of food may bring in species that wouldn't normally enter gardens.

BACK TO WINNING WAYS MOSTLY

FOSDYKE FC 3 BILLINGHAY 2

Victory for the Tangerine Dream! A much needed three points against an energetic and youthful Billingham Reserves sides that made Fosdyke work for their win

To start with things were going swimmingly and Fosdyke dominated possession and chances started flowing. Matt Howden was causing mayhem across the home sides back line and when he went through one-on-one from a defence-splitting pass from Scott Wiseman the keeper nearly smashed him in half just inside the box. Lucky to not be sent off, the home side's custodian's next task was to pick out the ball from the net when Ruslan Dukalskis belted the penalty past him.

This gave Fosdyke a lift and free flowing football followed. Piling pressure on the Billingham goal, a second was inevitable. When Marv Jolly flew in to a crunching tackle sending the ball to Scott Wiseman, who picked out another sublime pass, Matt Howden was sent scurrying down the wing and into the box. He completely bamboozled the home keeper with an audacious chip that was tapped in by a grateful Sam Reeson from close range

James Hawkes wanted in on the action and a thumping header was brilliantly saved and on the rebound the Fosdyke right back turned on the style with a Cruyff turn and shot that almost saw him add to our tally.

The second half however saw a turnaround as Fosdyke hit the self-destruct button. The home side struck an early goal when one of the defenders caught a half volley from the edge of the box just right and the moments-later indecision in defence gifted them a second.

It could have been worse when another instance of calamitous defending saw a Billingham striker run through with only Davis Ruduks to beat but the forward tripped over his own feet

Spurred in to action, Fosdyke fought back and Matt Howden went on a mazy run before slamming home from the edge of the box. The game then swung from end to end but no further scoring meant Fodyke finished 3-2 victors.

FOSDYKE FC 5 RIPPINGALE & FOLKINGHAM 1

Fosdyke had to endure a spell of pressure from the Rippingale and Folkingham fellows but Sam Leaf stood firm between the sticks and it was another Sam, this one Reeson, who had the final say, walloping home a fine cross from sub Ryan McMeechan with a well-controlled volley just before the final whistle which added the finishing touches to a most satisfying afternoon.

Leyton Hubbert took Man of the Match for an assured performance at left back and a cracking way to open his Fosdyke goal scoring account.

POINTON RES 2 FOSDYKE FC 2

All seemed quite innocuous at the start. Sam Reeson was on fire, ghosting around home defenders and nearly opened the scoring when he clipped a glorious shot over the keeper only to see some last ditch defending deny him.

At the other end Davis Ruduks was on hand to keep at bay the

Pointon striker who charged through one on one but was thwarted by the custodians quick reactions.
